"There is No Testimony Without a Test"



THE TEST: Do you acknowledge God in all your ways?

When my daughter was a teenager, she voiced her desire to become an architect. I was a bit skeptical since she did not appear to have the acumen and/or mindset for architecture. I often inquired with God about this desire and hoped that I was not influencing her in a way that was not aligned with God's will for her life. So, when she went to college she took the requisite classes and applied to the School of Architecture but was rejected. The rejection left her in a state of uncertainty. We contemplated her other interests but none fit her creative nature. Time was ticking to declare her major. Then, one morning my daughter called me from the university to tell me that a O & A luncheon would be held at noon in the School of Architecture regarding a major in Urban Design and that the luncheon was open to the general public. I gathered the children and readied them for the event. Upon arrival, we were greeted by the presenter and awaited the arrival of other attendees. To our astonishment, only my family was present, so we enjoyed the feast and all our questions were

answered. When we left, we knew that this occasion was divinely prepared for my daughter and that this would be her major. From that day forward, it seemed that whatever she put her hands to regarding her major was successful.

My daughter was the youngest person ever to graduate from the Urban Planning Department and managed to receive a bachelor's degree with a minor and certification in Geographic Information Systems. She accomplished all this with academic honors in the span of three years. She became the "poster child" for the university's School of Urban Planning. Her blessings did not stop there. While other students were having difficulties in securing internships, my daughter, on the other hand, had no problem. The only issue was that all internship positions in that department were unpaid. However, it was conveyed to her that the internship position would be unpaid because it was for a college credit. Nevertheless, two weeks after my daughter began her internship, the director, impressed with her knowledge and abilities, deviated from the established norm and compensated her as an employee. Her three months agreement turned into a year-long paid internship. At the end of the one year, her boss created a position specifically for her and doubled her pay.

My daughter has been employed now for eight years with the same company and has enjoyed a continuous outpouring of blessings and favor. After she gave birth to her first child, she was required to work only one day in the office. A few months later, she was required to work exclusively from home due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Shortly thereafter, her employer reconfigured her position so as to warrant my daughter a substantial pay increase. Two weeks ago, she received an email calling for all employees to return to regular working status. My daughter was gravely concerned about her future working arrangements in light of the fact that her desire was to be home with her two children. She shared with me her ideas and talking points regarding the situation in that she was to meet with her boss the next day. She grappled with what she should and should not ask for and the way she should approach her boss without appearing ungrateful for their past accommodations and generosity. We had a lengthy conversation posing various scenarios when it dawned on me that God is in control, and it is He alone who knows tomorrow. It was obvious that we were leaning to our own understanding and not walking by faith. We had forgotten how God had clearly been directing her/our path for the last eight years. So, we ceased the foolish talk, changed our conversation, and acknowledged God's sovereignty and faithfulness in this situation. I reminded her not to limit God but rather ask God for whatever she willed, without compromise.

THE TESTIMONY: On the next day, she was ecstatic to share how God had shown Himself strong in her life. She reported that her boss allowed her to continue to work from home. The blessing did not end there. The boss said that she would not be required to work face to face with the public nor attend to the quick service task that was confining. She previously feared that she would be required to work with the public in person and not have the necessary flexibility that she needed in order to care for her two little ones. What makes the story more miraculous is that my daughter received all her heart's desires even the things she did not inquire about. It was as if the boss had read my daughter's mind and heart. Wow, God really can do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think. Ephesians 3:20.

FOOD FOR FAITH: God says in Proverbs 3:6 to acknowledge him in **ALL** our ways and He **SHALL** direct our path. Be anxious for nothing but in **EVERYTHING** by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving let your request be made known to God. Philippians 4:6-7. For our Father knows the things we have need of before we even ask Him. Matthew 6:8. Imagine how many blessings we forfeit because we think we can figure life out apart from Him when He is the only one who knows the masterplan. It is imperative that we are mindful not to lean to our own understanding or we will certainly be lead by the lust of the eyes, lust of the flesh and the pride of life. 1 John 2:16.




If you think you are having a stroke, there are classic symptoms you can look for. These happen suddenly, and include:

- ♦ Trouble speaking or understanding

- Drooping or numbness on one side of the face

- ♦ Severe headache

A characteristic of all stroke symptoms is that they began suddenly and are severe. If you are with someone or not, please call 911 or your local emergency services immediately.

The National Stroke Association recommends an easy strategy to help you, if you think someone is having a stroke.

HOW WE RISE

Systemic racism and America today

Unaddressed systemic racism, in my mind, is the most important issue in the United States today. And it has been so since before the founding of our nation.

Slavery was America's "original sin." It was not solved by the framers of the U.S. Constitution, nor was it resolved by the horrendous conflict that was of the American Civil War. It simply changed its odious form and continued the generational enslavement of an entire stratum of American society. In turn, the Civil Rights Movement struck a mighty blow against

racism in America, and our souls soared when Dr. King told us he had a dream. But we were and still are far from the "promised land." And even when America rose up to elect its first Black President, Barack Obama, we may indeed have lost ground as a collective nation along the way, as on the night of Barack Obama's inauguration, a group of top GOP luminaries quietly gathered in a Washington steakhouse and formed a united front in which "the single most important thing they wanted to achieve was for President Obama to be a one-term president." The set of ideals and rhetoric that followed, spawned the Tea Party movement, Birthers' rhetoric, antigovernment sentiment, Trump election, intensified intolerance, broad division, misrepresentation of facts, Trump loss, and a riotous assault on the U.S. Capitol. While there



have been other instances of violence at the Capitol in the 19th and 20th centuries, that event was the most severe assault on the building since the 1814 burning of Washington City by the British Army during the War of 1812.

That is our legacy as Americans, and in many ways, the most hateful remnants of slavery persist in the U.S. today in the form of systemic racism baked into nearly every aspect of our society and who we are as a people. Indeed, for those tracing their heritage to countries outside of Western Europe, or for those with a non-Christian belief system, that undeniable truth often impacts every aspect of who you are as a person, in one form or another.

The reality of this history has been on stark display in recent weeks. From the terrible killings of George Floyd and Ahmaud Arbery, to the countless, untold acts of racism that take place every day across America, these are the issues that are defining the moment – just as our response will define who we are and will be in the 21st century and beyond. Truly, the very nature of our "national soul" is at stake, and we all have a deep responsibility to be a part of the solution.

For us at Brookings, race, racism, equality, and equity are now matters of presidential priority. Addressing systemic racism is a key component of those efforts, with research also focusing on the Latino and Native American communities; faith-based communities, including our Jewish and Muslim communities; and the threat of white supremacy and domestic terrorism also playing a major role. It will also include work on the important need for comprehensive police reform, to include reform rooted in local community engagement and empowerment. We will not solve systemic racism and inequality over-night, and we have so much work ahead. But in a world where we often spend more time debating the nature of our problems than taking meaningful action, we must find ways to contribute however we can and to move forward as a community.

I firmly believe that we as Americans cannot remain silent about injustice. Inaction is simply unacceptable, and we have to stand up and speak out. And if our elected representatives and our elected leadership deny the problem, and refuse to act, then we must take on the responsibility of reform from the bottom up with special attention at the ballot box.

And especially for those Americans who may look like me – a white American male – or come from a similar background, action begins with reflection, and most importantly listening. It's also about elevating and supporting the voices of those traditionally underrepresented, or even silenced, throughout society. How We Rise is an absolutely critical part of that solution.

Canadians: Recommend you divert YOUR course 15 degrees to the South to avoid collision.


Americans: This is the Captain of a US Navy Ship. I say again, divert YOUR course.
